Dear Partners,

In 2018, SM Foundation celebrated its 35 years of supporting communities. While anniversaries are times to celebrate milestones, it also beckons us to a moment of reflection.

Tatang Henry Sy, Sr. believed in the power one had to help change another's life. With that conviction, he believed that the key to helping a family overcome poverty not only for today but for generations to come, was to educate a child.

Founded on the principle of "**people helping people**," the past 35 years has been an anthology of inspiring stories of how hope has stirred lasting change in the lives of the people we have been privileged to be part of.

From our first scholarship batch in 1993, we have become part of the lives of 8,243 college and technical-vocational scholars. From the first health center we renovated in 2002, we have become instrumental in upgrading 155 public health centers to date. Since the first batch of 191 farmers trained in 2007, we have rolled up our sleeves and planted side by side 23,170 rural and urban farmers nationwide. Along the way, we have been given an insight to the unique world of persons with special needs through SM Cares.

Our journey is a testament of what can be achieved when **people help people**.



While our hearts are overwhelmed with joy on how far we have gone, our minds remain steadfast on how we can create greater impact in the communities we serve as we move along into the future. As such, we deepened our focus on impact investing – understanding the shared value we generate and targeting resources to its optimum impact aligned to the Sustainable Development Goals. Moreover, we aligned this year's report to the GRI standards, discussing in great detail our material topics, stakeholder engagement, economic impact and people development.


People Helping People



Scholarship Program


We award scholarship grants for technicalvocational courses and college education to develop the youth to their full potential and find gainful employment or become entrepreneurs.

As the world faces monumental global changes to leapfrog into the future, the need to prepare our youth is ever more pressing. Having a college degree brings about wealth beyond mere economic values.






Jeffrey Manhulad is a Manobo from Bukidnon who was abandoned by his mother at the age of four to live with his father.

After his first grade, he stopped schooling to help his father haul sacks of corn.

"I got P25 per trip, less 50% commission for the horse's owner. I would buy soup for snack and sardines for dinner." he recalls.

Understanding the importance of education, his father encouraged Jeff to go back to school, making him the first college graduate in their family. Since he graduated cum laude. he moved on to build his career at SM Prime Holdings. With a steady income, Jeff was able to buy a small farmland and horses for his father, helping him bid farewell to a life of hard labor.





Leonila Cabangbang used to sell vegetables on sidewalks with her grandmother to help her family. Her father was a laborer while her mother was a housewife.

After high school, she was working as a cashier at a billiard hall when she saw the SM college scholarship poster and applied. She was accepted at PNU under the Bachelor of Elementary Education (BEED) with English Concentration Program.

After graduating cum laude in 2004, she fulfilled her promise to her siblings to bring them to SM City North EDSA.

We see how our scholars transform. Once they graduate, they begin to see the expanse of their wings when they start to fly and marvel in the magnificent new world that is now within their reach.

She grew in her career as officer-incharge of one of the most prominent restaurants in the country. Currently, she rested from her career to be a full-time mom to her 1 year old child.

We provide therapeutic ambiance in health centers nationwide by creating the Felicidad T. Sy Wellness Centers for Children and the Elderly.








FARMING A Profession Of Hope

Long before food security has become a global concern, Tatang Henry Sy, Sr. recognized that our farmers remained to be the most underserved sector of society. He also recognized early on that small scale sustainable farming would be key to food security not only for families but for communities as well.



Rural and Urban Farming

We help families have nutritious food supply by training them how to grow their own food through sustainable backyard farming techniques.

Developing Clusters of Farming Communities Barangay Food Security

The Philippines currently faces an increasing gap in the number of farmers required to sustain food security at the barangay level versus the increase in population and demand for local food sources. With the aging farming population at 57 years old being the average age, it is imminent to bring farmers back to farming, while providing opportunities for the younger generation to be trained in sustainable farming techniques.


To date, most of the food sources at the barangay level is imported from the nearest city sources. Not only does this increase food cost and supply chain risks, it also under utilizes the rural farm lands and local farming talents.

SM Foundation helps the most vulnerable barangays attain food security through its Kabalikat sa Kabuhayan (KSK) Farmers' Training Program. We provide a holistic approach to farmers training – from identifying target beneficiary groups to promoting social inclusion particularly to women and senior citizens, from providing theoretical understanding to conducting hands-on sustainable farming techniques, from providing financial literacy sessions to actual linkages to market, from value formation sessions to creating social capital.

In partnership with the Department of Agriculture, the Department of Social Welfare and Development, the Barangays and Local Government Units, we launched KSK Farmers' Training Programs that are focused on addressing barangay food security sources with the objective to locally produce the vegetable and fruit requirements of the local barangay markets.











Among Tatang Henry Sy, Sr.'s 14 life principles, he noted the importance of social responsibility. During times of calamities, many Filipinos are left vulnerable. We leverage on the strategic locations of our stores and serve as first responders during calamities. We also help build the resilience of communities by building disaster resilient homes. 

Global Youth Summit

In 2018, close to 20,000 students registered for the event which was held at the Mall of Asia Arena to discuss the top UN Sustainability Development Goals they consider to be most pressing.



The Pink Ribbon Day for Breast Cancer is an initiative of the SM Cares Program on Women and Breastfeeding Mothers in partnership with the Philippine Breast Cancer Society (PBCS).

Pink Ribbon Day, which started in 2017, is a one-day event that is held every October in observance of Breast Cancer Awareness Month. During the activity, volunteer doctors from the Philippine Breast Cancer Society offer free clinical breast examinations. Likewise, inspirational talks from known celebrity breast cancer survivors are featured during the event. Through their inspiring stories, women gain insights on how they can take care of themselves through their journey in fighting breast cancer.

Together with PBCS, SM Cares hopes that through the Pink Ribbon Day event, women will learn that the best way to fight breast cancer is through healthy lifestyle choices, early detection and early intervention.









The **SM Bears of Joy** is an annual Christmas charity project led by SM Cares, SM Supermalls and Toy Kingdom. During this period, shoppers can buy a pair of toy bears for only PHP200, keeping one while donating the other for charity.

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

Upholding Accountability and Transparency

SM Foundation adheres to national and global standards of accountability and transparency. In 2018, the Foundation operated on a total donation income of PHP320 million with 73% of its fund sources coming from its parent company, the SM Group and its affiliates. The remaining is a consolidated fund from individual and corporate partners, particularly in the education program. Around PHP277 million, equivalent to 86% of the total donation income, was used to fund the various programs of the Foundation and cover general and administrative expenses.



Good Governance

SM Foundation adheres to the parent company's Code of Conduct and governance policies (refer to SM Investments Corporation Annual Report and Sustainability Report). As a corporate foundation, it aligns with the sustainability strategy of SM and complies to the principles and standards of the Philippine Council for NGO Certification, the Department of Social Welfare and Development, the Department of Education and the Department of Health.
